


Play on Philly

Play On Philly (POP) provides high-quality music education to students who would typically lack access as a vehicle for life skills and academic achievement. We provide intensive music instruction and ensemble practice every day before and after school and over 25 performance opportunities throughout the year. Students range from pre-Kindergarten to 12th grade and are loaned an orchestral instrument at no cost. POP programming has proven results: our students score ten points higher on standardized tests and have improved behavior and study skills. Brass Trio: Two Plus One

William Gregory, trumpet Tessa K. Ellis, trumpet Michael Fahrner, euphonium

Will Gregory is a performer and educator based in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania and has performed with the Allentown Symphony, Bay Atlantic Symphony, Garden State Philharmonic and Lancaster Symphony, and can frequently be heard playing musicals at the Media Theater. He is a founding member of the Opus 5 brass quintet, with which he recorded their self-titled first album. He was featured as Eb cornet soloist playing "The Higher Plane" on Atlantic Brass Band's album Metropolis, with whom he also won 3 North American Brass Band Association championships. He has an interest in historically informed performance and played a cornet made in 1882 with Newberry's Victorian Cornet Band on their albums Thomas Coates: The Father of Band Music in America and The Gilded Age. He teaches approximately 150 students as a brass specialist and instrumental music teacher for the School District of Philadelphia. He is a graduate of Interlochen Arts Academy, Eastman School of Music (B.M.) and Temple University (M.M.)

Tessa Ellis is a freelance trumpeter and founding member of the Arcana New Music Ensemble. As an orchestral musician, she's performed with ensembles including the Rochester Philharmonic, Chamber Orchestra of Philadelphia and the Allentown Symphony. She won first place in two divisions of the National Trumpet Competition and was a finalist in the 2016 Ellsworth Smith International Trumpet Solo Competition. Tessa teaches at Swarthmore College and Settlement Music School. She studied with David Bilger at the Curtis Institute of Music, earning a B.M. (2017) and a Community Artist Fellowship Diploma (2018).

Michael Fahrner is Adjunct Professor of Euphonium at Rowan University, low brass faculty of Rowan Community Music School and Assistant Director of the Atlantic Youth Brass Band. He is on the brass faculty of Settlement Music School's Music Education Pathways program and maintains a private studio virtually and in person. Michael has been a featured soloist with the Atlantic Brass Band, a North American Brass Band Association Championship Ensemble and has competed internationally at the South East Tuba Euphonium Conference and at the Lieksa Brass Week in Lieska, Finland. As a relentless advocate for the euphonium, Michael actively commissions new and adventurous



works for the instrument. He earned his Bachelor of Music degree in Euphonium performance from the University of Massachusetts, Amherst and his Master of Music degree in Euphonium Performance from Georgia State University.

The Marian Anderson Museum & Historical Society

is an organization dedicated to keeping the legacy of the late African American historic classical singer by showcasing her residence—a National Historical Landmark—as a museum, giving thematic educational tours of her life and history and also supporting the development and performance of Young Professional Classical & Performing Artist Scholars. The organization was founded by the late Lady Blanche Burton-Lyles and has existed for over 29 years. The Scholar Artist is given support with private coaching, lessons, performance wardrobe, travel to auditions, travel to contracted performances and promotion as a Marian Anderson



Scholar Artist. Most importantly, our Marian Anderson Scholar Artists perform every year with our Marian Anderson Historical Society Concerting Season of at least five to six shows a year. The national Marian Anderson Historical Society also has an Arts Empowerment Project which provides education, development, mentorship and performance for all children from 4-18 in the arts in the Tri-State Area.
